Think about problems of **religion** (how religion justified a monarch's position), **legitimacy** (who could claim to be a king) **authority** (how much was respect important to be a monarch) and **power** (who could be kind because they had the strength to be so)

Music - Anthems

Music is often used to express a groups pride in their culture, achievements, values and community. This can be very formal, for example music at the upcoming coronation, national anthems etc. Or it can be very informal. These songs are often called anthems.

I have included a list of three very different Anthems used to express pride in some way. Versions of each Anthem can be found on Spotify, Youtube and other streaming services. Listen to each piece and try and understand what meaning and emotions the composer is trying to express. You can also consider how effective the piece is in communicating 'pride'.

Zadoc the Priest by Handel

Zadoc the Priest is a piece of choral music composed by Handel for the coronation of George II in 1727. It has been sung at ever coronation since then. You might think it sounds familiar, that is because it was used as the basis for the Champions League Anthem.

Handel had a talent for the dramatic and theatrical. This piece seems to sum up the pomp and majesty of a coronation.

Hen Wlad Fy Nhadau (Land of my Fathers)

Hen Wlad Fy Nhadau is the National Anthem of Wales. It is most famous for being sung at the start of rugby games. The words are written by Evan James and the melody was written by his son, James James.

We Are the Champions - Queen

This song is used for many occasions and by many groups to express their pride in an achievement, especially sporting. Member of Queen said that when composing this song, they "wanted to get the crowds waving and singing. It's very unifying and positive."

It is a very positive message and heroic lyrics mean it remains popular 45 years after its first performance.

Is there a song that you feel would be a good Anthem for Parkside? One that expresses our values and our achievements. If you can think of one, please let Mr Crane know your idea.
